
Mercy on the Mall (December 8th)

The 26th UN Climate Conference (or COP26 for short) begins today in Glasgow and will go on until November 12 th. We are already seeing signs of climate breakdown. Parts of the world are under threat because of rising sea levels due to global warming. Severe extreme weather events are causing devastation, destroying lives, homes, lands and livelihoods, especially in the poorest parts of the world which are most at risk.

At COP21 in December 2015, the Paris Agreement was reached which committed countries to try to limit global warming to 1.5°C above pre-industrial levels and not to allow it to go above 2°C. Six years later, global temperature rises are on track to reach a catastrophic 3°C.

Pope Francis, along with other religious leaders has called on those attending COP26 to renew their commitment to keep global temperatures below 1.5°C and to take action to make this possible.

"We have inherited a garden: we must not leave a desert to our children," the statement says.

We are asked to pray for the success of COP26 during these days.

We acknowledge the responsibilities you have placed upon

as stewards of your creation.

November is a special time of the year when in a heartfelt and intimate way 'We Remember' all our loved ones who passed over to new life with Christ this past year. Death, loss, and sadness is something we all experience, but in a particular way the death of a family member, relative, neighbour, or friend is all the more difficult to come to terms with and comprehend. We have lived with them, shared our lives with them, and walked the road of life through the joys and challenges with them. Their passing leaves a huge void and absence in our lives, and we will never forget their presence in our lives. While they are no longer physically present to us, their spirit lives in our hearts.

In remembering our loved ones we are brought back to the moment they breathed their last. We recall with affection in the midst of the tears, the final words they said to us. We feel the sense of the mystery of the moment where they closed their eyes to this world and opened them to life with the Father in heaven. In remembering our loved one we are brought back to planning for their funeral ritual and carrying out their final wishes. Whether it was celebrated in a Church, or the Crematorium Chapel, or in the home, or at the graveside we bid them farewell until we meet again.

This past year the passing of our loved ones occurs in the context of the pandemic. The grieving process was made all the more challenging and upsetting with restrictions and protocols. Yet within the reality of those experiences, the words of the Saviour Jesus Christ gives us hope;

'Do not let your hearts be troubled, trust in God...'

In the past year we have perhaps understood there is a part of life that doesn't belong to us, but to God. We do not know the day or the hour when God will call us. But I'd like to think we continue to do our best, to give without counting the cost, to have a sense of compassion and kindness. I have no doubt the legacy of your loved one is now bestowed on you, and you now take on the baton of their lives. In that task may you be given the courage and fortitude to live each day with a heart of love. In so doing you will truly stand at that moment in time, when you will never ever lose them again.

God bless you and may your loved one be enfolded in God's love forever.
