**FIRST READING Isaiah 35: 1 - 6.10**

**A reading from the prophet Isaiah**  
 Let the wilderness and the dry-lands exult, let the wasteland rejoice and bloom, let it bring forth flowers like the jonquil, let it rejoice and sing for joy.

The glory of Lebanon is bestowed on it, the splendour of Carmel and Sharon; they shall see the glory of the Lord, the splendour of our God.

**GOSPEL Matthew 11: 2 -11**

**A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew.**

John in his prison had heard what Christ was doing and he sent his disciples to ask him, 'Are you the one who is to come, or have we got to wait for someone else?' Jesus answered, 'Go back and tell John what you hear and see; the blind see again, and the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, and the dead are raised to life and the Good News is proclaimed to the poor; and happy is the man who does not lose faith in me.'

As the messengers were leaving, Jesus began to talk to the people about John: 'What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed swaying in the breeze? No? Then what did you go out to see? A man wearing fine clothes? Oh no, those who wear fine clothes are to be found in palaces. Then what did you go out for? To see a prophet? Yes, I tell you, and much more than a prophet: he is the one of whom scripture says: Look, I am going to send my messenger before you; he will prepare your way before you. I tell you solemnly, of all the children born of women, a greater than John the Baptist has never been seen; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he is.'

## Rejoice



One of the most poignant conversations in the gospel takes place between John the Baptist and some of his companions who visit him in prison after his arrest by Herod. John must know, I think, that his prospects are

not good and somewhere between hope and desperation he asks his companions to go to Jesus and put the question, 'Are you the one who is to come, or have we got to wait for someone else?' It is such a loaded question, so full of expectation but tinged with fear of disappointment.

People all around us are wondering the same. They wonder and hope...and pray that someone will help them in whatever difficulty confronts them. They are also afraid that no-one will. Coming up to Christmas these feelings are especially strong.

John got his answer – the Messiah had come! It was a time to rejoice; the blind see, the lame walk, lepers are healed. As Christians, we get to share that joy but also to accept the challenge that comes with it. To love and care for each other just as Jesus loves and cares for us.

You don't have to belong to a charitable organisation to do something. Members of the Society of St Vincent De Paul, for example, will do their utmost to meet some of the needs of people who come to them. You can help them in their commitment. You can be part of the effort to answer the question, 'Are you the one who is to come, or have we got to wait for someone else?'
