The gospel today is often called the mission statement of the Church, like any organisation writes its mission statement. The mission statement lets us know what is essential to the Church: each of them is worth our consideration and worth our commitment. However, they do not come out of fresh air. The mission statement is related to the vision of the Church is – a vision based on the life and ministry of Jesus.

He himself lived the beatitudes before and as he preached them: a man who was humble, gentle, merciful in his relationships with everyone; who could mourn others and for his world; who had a commitment to justice and right; lived his message as he taught it and was himself persecuted to the end. Without our relationship with Jesus, the beatitudes would be just a set of regulations.

Pope Francis expands them, saying: "Blessed are those Christian communities who live this authentic gospel simplicity! Poor in spirit means they are rich in God. Blessed are the shepherds who do not ride the logic of worldly success, but follow the law of love: welcoming, listening, serving. Blessed is the Church who does not entrust herself to the criteria of functionalism and organizational efficiency, nor worries about her image, (quoting St. Thérèse), "Jesus does not demand great actions from us, but simply surrender and gratitude".
