LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING Genesis 2:7-9; 3:1-7

A reading from the book of Genesis

The Lord God fashioned man of dust from the soil. Then he breathed into his nostrils a breath of life, and thus man became a living being.

The Lord God planted a garden in Eden which is in the east, and there he put the man he had fashioned. The Lord God caused to spring up from the soil every kind of tree, enticing to look at and good to eat, with the tree of life and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil in the middle of the garden.

The serpent was the most subtle of all the wild beasts that the Lord God had made. It asked the woman, 'Did God really say you were not to eat from any of the trees in the garden?' The woman answered the serpent, 'We may eat the fruit of the trees in the garden. But of the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden God said, "You must not eat it, nor touch it, under pain of death".' Then the serpent said to the woman, 'No! You will not die! God knows in fact that on the day you eat it your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods, knowing good and evil.' The woman saw that the tree was good to eat and pleasing to the eye, and that it was desirable for the knowledge that it could give. So she took some of its fruit and ate it. She gave some also to her husband who was with her, and he ate it. Then the eyes of both of them were opened and they realised that they were naked. So they sewed fig-leaves together to make themselves loin-cloths.

I was driving and pulled up at the traffic lights. I shared the space with a few other cyclists. A car was pulling across the road and was let into the space by a kindly motorist.

When he pulled into the queue of traffic his bumper was ever so slightly in the cycling lane. Not a problem; no one wanted his tail end sticking out on on-coming traffic on the other side of the road. There was a courteous facilitation of his plight.

A cyclist appeared out of nowhere. He stopped and uttered some very colourful expletives to the motorist. Other cyclists, looked at one another, wondering what his problem was and then watched with amazement at what happened next. Having finished his tirade he belted off, breaking two red lights within a hundred yards of each other. The reflection is not about the merits of cycling nor is it the foundation of one of the many discussions that are had on the airwaves between motorists and cyclists.

This reflection is more about anger. There is a lot of it about. You don't have to be long on the road whether you are on a bike, in a car, or some other vehicle to spot anger, even to feel it. I suppose people get angry because they feel someone is in their way or they do something that the person who gets angry considers to be foolish. Maybe we do get in others' way or maybe we do foolish things, but an angry response normally helps no one. As a matter of fact, anger begets anger and even provokes more of it so it doesn't go away, and it can leave us feeling sorry for ourselves or even a feeling a little self-righteous – I'm right and the whole world is wrong.

Traditionally in Lent we've given up things or we've done other things to help us on our spiritual journey -this Lent why not watch the anger levels, remembering of course that not all anger is unjustified, and in the face of wrongdoing righteous anger can have a place but it can't last for ever..
