At this, the servant threw himself down at his master's feet. "Give me time" he said "and I will pay the whole sum." And the servant's master felt so sorry for him that he let him go and cancelled the debt. Now as this servant went out, he happened to meet a fellow servant who owed him one hundred denarii: and he seized him by the throat and began to throttle him. "Pay what you owe me" he said. His fellow servant fell at his feet and implored him, saying, "Give me time and I will pay you." But the other would not agree; on the contrary, he had him thrown into prison till he should pay the debt. His fellow servants were deeply distressed when they saw what had happened, and they went to their master and reported the whole

affair to him. Then the master sent for him. "You wicked servant," he said "I cancelled all that debt of yours when you appealed to me. Through Christ's own blood we have been forgiven. We did not earn this forgiveness - it is God's gift to us. We in return must forgive in the same way - not with strings attached, not once only, but unconditionally, freely and always.



Focus

The parable is a story with Eastern exaggerations but it's making the point -bout how God treats us; always forgiving.

It's hard sometimes to accept the forgiveness of God and that's what confession is about. No matter what we did, or how we feel about what we have done, God forgives. His nature is to be merciful.

The story is about us too – a man is forgiven a lot and then doesn't forgive a neighbour. It is hard to forgive: you may be cheated by the banks or the pension scheme; or be a victim of abuse or bullying; cheated of a place for your child in a school; let down by your partner in big or small ways, receive harsh treatment in religious life; we can carry hurts forever. But we can pray a forgiveness prayer and try to let the big forgiveness of God enter our hearts and it can happen gradually.

Some hurts and burdens are heavy to carry through life. To forgive can release some of that weight. The person who hurt us may be dead or may not even know (or care) that we are hurting. When we desire to forgive but don't know how; one way of looking for this strength is to pray for it. When we pray we are praying to be forgiving people! Sitting with the crucified Jesus can lighten the burden as we know Jesus loves and wants to forgive us all. Jesus has a lot to forgive — death while innocent, betrayed, let down. He got through it!

We can thank God for God's forgiveness; and for the times I could let go, and for times I was forgiven. And we know we are invited with God's help into the bright fragrant world of forgiveness.
