The Synod in Rome

The synod that Pope Francis called has completed the second stage of its reflections. The themes that were discerned included: Leadership & Service; Missionary activity, The Role of the laity; The centrality of the family; Evangelization in a digital world with attention to those who do not have access to digital media; Lay Ministries; Clericalism that hinders communion; The role of women in the church including inclusive language and the matter of female deacons; Initial and ongoing training of both priests; laypeople and Ecumenism; Interreligious dialogue. The next phase will look at "Participation Governance and Authority. Pope Francis hopes that this Synod is modelling how we as a church can be in the world by pausing to listen, pray and discern where the Spirit of God is guiding us at this time.

Fr. Michael looks forward to meeting you all then.

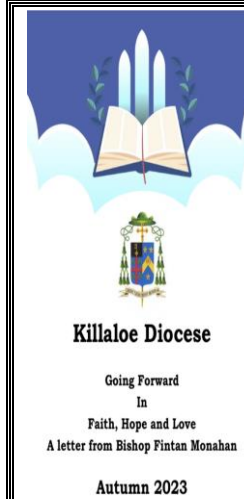
Last Sunday's Collection and Mission Sunday

APOSTLES' CREED

'Give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God' is a well-known and oft quoted line from the gospel. Jesus said it to the Pharisees after they had shown him a Roman coin that had Caesar's image on it. Caesar's image gave the coin authenticity and distinguished it from fake currency.

According to the Bible we are made in the image and likeness of God. That the Creator's image is stamped on us gives us our unique value and dignity as humans. Nothing else in the universe is made in God's image and likeness. We are peerless, and 'wonderfully made' – Psalm 138. In these times of 'man's inhumanity to man' it is horrifying to see what we do to one another as humans. Neither our ethnic origin, gender, sexual direction, nationality, the colour of our skin, nor the accent of our speech diminishes our humanness and image and likeness to God.

Baptism puts us in a new and infinitely richer relationship with God. It leaves an indelible mark on us. Through it we become the gold standard of humanity, that for which God made us in the first place. The Church is the community of the baptised. It may not always seem so, but Baptism is the great mystery of our faith. Through baptism we share in Christ's victory over sin and death, Christ lives in us, and we share in the divine life of God.
