A reading from the prophet Ezekiel.

As a shepherd keeps all his flock in view when he stands up in the middle of his scattered sheep, so shall I keep my sheep in view. I shall rescue them from wherever they have been scattered during the mist and darkness. I myself will pasture my sheep, I myself will show them where to rest - it is the Lord who speaks. SECOND READING *1 Corinthians 15: 20 - 26.28.*

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians.

Christ has been raised from the dead, the first-fruits of all who have fallen asleep. Death came through one man and in the same way the resurrection of the dead has come through one man. Just as all men die in Adam, so all men will be brought to life in Christ; but all of them in their proper order: Christ as the first-fruits and then, after the coming of Christ, those who belong to him. After that will come the end, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father, having done away with every sovereignty, authority and power. For he must be king until he has put all his enemies under his feet and the last of the enemies to be destroyed is death. And when everything is subjected to him, then the Son himself will be subject in his turn to the One who subjected all things to him, so that God may be all in all.

GOSPEL *Matthew 25: 31 - 46.*

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus said to his disciples: 'When the Son of Man comes in his glory, escorted by all the angels, then he will take his seat on his throne of glory. All the nations will be assembled before him and he will separate men one from another as the shepherd separates sheep from goats. He will place the sheep on his right hand and the goats on his left. Then the King will say to those on his right hand, "Come, you whom my Father has blessed, take for your heritage the kingdom prepared for you since the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food; I was thirsty and you gave me drink; I was a stranger and you made me welcome; naked and you clothed me; sick and you visited me, in prison and you came to see me." Then the virtuous will say to him in reply, "Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you; or thirsty and give you drink? We might expect readings full of praise for the feast of Christ the King; they are rather readings of care. Ezekiel writes of the God who looks after the lost, the stray, the wounded. He has God going out with

bandages for our wounds! Our gospel goes further – that in caring for people, especially the needy, we are in fact caring for Jesus, Son of God. He thanks us for doing good for others, for that is doing good for him.

In the gospel Jesus presents us with a representative list of those who need the most looking after in the world then and now, like the hungry and thirsty, who will die if help is not given. He highlights people who are often neglected as not worth our time – the stranger, the prisoner and the sick. He looks out for the least ones. He had a care for children who were often forgotten in his time.

A challenge today in trying to care for the millions who starve and lack good water; the people confined in nursing homes because of age and infirmity; the prisoner, locked and hidden away. And many others. They are ones Jesus remembers every day himself. Can we do the same, and put our remembrance into action?
