THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 21st January 2024

Sunday of the Word of God (Catholic School Week begins) The calling of Jesus is a calling to a generous and wholehearted following of his gospel.





Imagine two children looking up at the stars. One says, "I bet you those stars are five miles away." The other replies, "No, stupid, they are ten miles away." And they have a big argument over how far away

the stars are. The children have no concept of 41,000,000,000,000 kilometres, (which of us has?), the distance of the nearest star to us, so they use concepts, five miles and ten miles, which, to them, means a long way away, but which are hopelessly inadequate to express the reality. Similarly, our human concepts can never understand God because God is mystery. So, when our Christian denominations argue over theological issues, we are like the children arguing over five miles or ten miles! And we allow those arguments to divide us! But we are united by all that we have in common: we believe in God, the mystery; we believe that Jesus was born, died on a cross and rose again; we commit ourselves to obeying, as best we can, the extremely difficult new commandment which he gave us, to "love one another as I have loved you," and we seek to continue the task Jesus began, to build the Kingdom of God "on earth as it is in Heaven." In all our parishes, working with other denominations to promote justice, peace and inclusion on earth is both Christian Unity in action, and in progress. All Christians are called, not only to pray for Christian Unity, but to work together for it.
