

The mention of leprosy in scripture awakens thoughts of illness and isolation and the hope of healing and "re-belonging". The mention of TB in our own recent history produces similar thoughts. Sanatorium

campuses were developed at Peamount and Blanchardstown on the outskirts of Dublin and Merlin Park on the outskirts of Galway city. These hospitals offered respiratory care in airy wards to patients who had to spend time away from their families.

What a coincidence that we are hearing these themes of healing and "re-belonging" on this Temperance Sunday and also on this World Day of the Sick. A Sunday for Temperance is marked every year on the weekend just before Lent while a day of Prayer for the Sick is observed every year on the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes! These two events merge today and blend beautifully with our scripture texts.

For 125 years, Pioneers have been praying every day for people who have been impacted and isolated by addiction. The need is still great as we see the amount of people who are waiting on a place in a Treatment centre. These people from all walks of life need our prayers as they entrust themselves to the Lord for His healing or to a Higher Power.
