It is this: in my preaching, to be able to offer the Good News free, and not insist on the rights which the gospel gives me.

So though I am not a slave of any man I have made myself the slave of everyone so as to win as many as I could. For the weak I made myself weak. I made myself all things to all men in order to save some at any cost; and I still do this, for the sake of the gospel, to have a share in its blessing.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

On leaving the synagogue, Jesus went with James and John straight to the house of Simon and Andrew. Now Simon's mother-in-law had gone to bed with fever, and they told him about her straightaway. He went to her, took her by the hand and helped her up. And the fever left her and she began to wait on them.

That evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were sick and those who were possessed by devils. The whole town came crowding round the door, and he cured many who were suffering from diseases of one kind or another; he also cast out many devils, but he would not allow them to speak, because they knew who he was.

In the morning, long before dawn, he got up and left the house, and went off to a lonely place and prayed there. Simon and his companions set out in search of him, and when they found him they said, 'Everybody is looking for you.' He answered, 'Let us go elsewhere, to the neighbouring country towns, so that I can preach there too, because that is why I came.' And he went all through Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and casting out devils.

The Word of God



Prayer and Care.

Today's gospel captures two important facets of Jesus – as Son of God and, as a man living in the world. As son of God, he continues his mission: preaching, healing, casting out demons - a way of being which we cannot hope to comprehend. In other ways this day in his life is very relatable. He is busy, the day is hectic with constant demands upon his time. We can all relate to that. Even in the cool of the evening after his supper he is still preaching and healing and then to bed. A day lived in the service of others. A day that might feel familiar to any parent of young children or anyone caring for a relative or simply busy at work. An early start the next morning for prayer and even his prayer was interrupted as they were all looking for him.

Two big parts of Jesus' life --- care for those in need, and prayer. We find him at prayer at all the important events of his life - before choosing his apostles, his agony in the garden, his teachings on prayer. It was the centre and motivation of his life, keeping him in daily love with God his Father.

This motivation extended into his care for the sick, a constant in the gospels.

These are two constants in the community of the Church – a community who pray both personally and together; and who care in family, parish, and the world for all who are sick and in need.
