## LITURGY OF THE WORD

### FIRST READING 2 Chronicles 36:14-16. 19-23

**A reading from the second book of Chronicles.**

All the heads of the priesthood, and the people too, added infidelity to infidelity, copying all the shameful practices of the nations and defiling the Temple that the Lord had consecrated for himself in Jerusalem. The Lord, the God of their ancestors, tirelessly sent them messenger after messenger, since he wished to spare his people and his house. But they ridiculed the messengers of God, they despised his words, they laughed at his prophets, until at last the wrath of the Lord rose so high against his people that there was no further remedy.

Their enemies burned down the Temple of God, demolished the walls of Jerusalem, set fire to all its palaces, and destroyed everything of value in it. The survivors were deported by Nebuchadnezzar to Babylon; they were to serve him and his sons until the kingdom of Persia came to power. This is how the word of the Lord was fulfilled that he spoke through Jeremiah, 'Until this land has enjoyed its sabbath rest, until seventy years have gone by, it will keep sabbath throughout the days of its desolation.'

And in the first year of Cyrus king of Persia, to fulfil the word of the Lord that was spoken through Jeremiah, the Lord roused the spirit of Cyrus king of Persia to issue a proclamation and to have it publicly displayed throughout his kingdom: 'Thus speaks Cyrus king of Persia, "The Lord, the God of heaven, has given me all the kingdoms of the earth; he has ordered me to build him a Temple in Jerusalem, in Judah. Whoever there is among you of all his people, may his God be with him! Let him go up."

This was to show for all ages to come, through his goodness towards us in Christ Jesus, how infinitely rich he is in grace. Because it is by grace that you have been saved, through faith; not by anything of your own, but by a gift from God; not by anything that you have done, so that nobody can claim the credit. We are God's work of art, created in Christ Jesus to live the good life as from the beginning he had meant us to live it.

## GOSPEL John 3:14-21

**A reading from the holy Gospel according to John**

Jesus said to Nicodemus: 'The Son of Man must be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him. Yes, God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not be lost but may have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but so that through him the world might be saved. No one who believes in him will be condemned; but whoever refuses to believe is condemned already, because he has refused to believe in the name of God's only Son. On these grounds is sentence pronounced: that though the light has come into the world men have shown they prefer darkness to the light because their deeds were evil. And indeed, everybody who does wrong hates the light and avoids it, for fear his actions should be exposed; but the man who lives by the



truth comes out into the light, so that it may be plainly seen that what he does is done in God. '

# focus on sunday

FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT 10th March 2024

(Laetare Sunday)

Jesus offers a message of hope and salvation to the whole world.



**Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert**



A Christian should never look like someone who has just come back from a funeral! We traditionally think of Lent as a time of penance, fasting and prayer and can't wait for it to end. We rarely see it as a time of joy. But Lent is based on our belief that we live, every moment of our lives, in the knowledge that we are loved, infinitely and unconditionally, by God. Gratitude is the only foundation on which we can build an authentic relationship with God. And so, like Jesus, who spent forty days in the desert, discerning God's will for him and rejecting the temptations which would divert him from doing God's will, we too, in gratitude for being loved by God, reflect during Lent on God's will for us. Like Jesus, we are all surrounded by many temptations, which can, subtly and unsuspectingly, divert us from doing God's will. *"Whenever our interior life becomes caught up in its own interests and concerns, there is no longer room for others, no place for the poor. God's voice is no longer heard, the quiet joy of his love is no longer felt, and the desire to do good fades."* (The Joy of the Gospel, Ch 1 v 2). Laetare (meaning: rejoice) Sunday is a reminder that our penance, fasting and prayer, in the search for God's will, is always a time of rejoicing, as we allow the Spirit to challenge us and lead us to a closer relationship with God.
