We can be sure that we love God's children if we love God himself and do what he has commanded us; this is what loving God is - keeping his commandments; and his commandments are not difficult, because anyone who has been begotten by God has already overcome the world; this is the victory over the world - our faith. Who can overcome the world? Only the man who believes that Jesus is the Son of God; Jesus Christ who came by water and blood, not with water only, but with water and blood; with the Spirit as another witness - since the Spirit is the truth.

GOSPEL John 20: 19 - 31

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you.

'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.'

After saving this he breathed on them and said:

'Receive the Holy Spirit, For those whose sins you forglve, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord', he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him:



You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name. *The Gospel of the Lord.*

Easter for Thomas was a rediscovery of his faith in Jesus. The risen power of the Lord is the basis for his people's faith.





"This is my commandment, love one another as I have loved you." (John 15 v 12.) Few of us will have to give our lives, as Jesus did, for our brothers and sisters, though some do in other parts of the

world. But always loving others, excluding no-one, even when it is inconvenient, difficult or awkward, or makes us unpopular, is truly saintly. But there is yet a higher form of love: to forgive someone who has offended us and may not even have asked for our forgiveness. If Jesus asks us to "Love your enemies, pray for those who persecute you." (Matthew 5 v 44) he is only asking us to imitate Jesus, who, while we were still enemies (Romans 5 v 10), reconciled us to God by dying on the cross.

We have traditionally been taught that God will forgive us our sins, after we have expressed our sorrow and asked for forgiveness. But through the death of Jesus, we have been forgiven before we even ask. True sorrow for our sinfulness arises from our experience of the extraordinary love and compassion of God, a love "that surpasses all knowledge" (Ephesians 3 v 18), which leads us to ask ourselves "How could I possibly have offended such a loving God?" On Divine Mercy Sunday we celebrate the good news that we have been loved and forgiven by God. The bad news is that we are called to do the same to others!
