NINETEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 11th August 2024

The companionship of Christ is "food for the journey". He is the one who strengthens us to live in his love and according to his gospel.
When I give to another in love, I am giving communion.
I am a minister of the Eucharist.



"I am the bread..."



Bread and wine was the staple diet of ordinary people at the time of Jesus. If the rains did not come, or were delayed, the harvest would be late and the crop yield might be insufficient to feed them during the remainder of the year. Hence the bread they required to prevent them going hungry, or even to stay alive (as in Gaza today), was a very insecure source of food on which they could not always depend. In that context, Jesus declares that He is "the bread of life." Deepening our relationship with Jesus through prayer and Eucharist, leading to following his path of self-sacrificing love for others, is our path to authentic living and to experiencing that peace which Jesus promised to his disciples, a peace which the world cannot give. The Eucharist, where we encounter Jesus present in the bread and wine, is at the heart of the Christian community. At the consecration, "This is my body which will be given up for you; this is my blood which will be poured out for you" we recall the total self-sacrifice of Jesus, giving up everything for our sake, even what was most precious to him, his own life. Uniting ourselves, then, with Jesus, when receiving communion, is to unite ourselves with his self-sacrifice, and so is to bear witness, before the whole community, that we, too, are willing to sacrifice ourselves for our brothers and sisters.
