Listen, my dear brothers: it was those who are poor according to the world that God chose, to be rich in faith and to be the heirs to the kingdom which he promised to those who love him.

### GOSPEL *Mark 7:31-37*

**A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark**

Returning from the district of Tyre, Jesus went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, right through the Decapolis region. And they brought him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him, 'Ephphatha', that is, 'Be opened.' And his ears were opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened and he spoke clearly. And Jesus ordered them to tell no one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He has done all things well,' they said, 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.'

The signs that Jesus is present and that we are his true witnesses is that we attend to our sick, console those who are in despair, befriend the friendless; work for social justice, we must not be mute through fear or self - protection. We must do all things well.

There is much to be discomfited by in today's Gospel. The Deaf community, with its own language and culture, may balk at the presentation of Jesus 'fixing' a person. Many of us might recoil at the image of

Jesus putting his fingers into the man's ears and mouth, and using his spittle. Yet the tangibly raw physicality reminds us that our God is not an abstract, sterile entity: our God is one who entered humanity in its entirety, and who continues to minister to the whole person. Sanitary concerns aside, St Mark reaffirms the holistic, hands-on ministry of Jesus, which is an inevitable consequence of the Incarnation, and of the need for us all to 'be opened' to God in every area our lives.

Today's readings all reinforce social justice as an integral component of Christian discipleship. Yet, in the Christian tradition, social justice is not a comfortable philanthropy. It is one which requires us, too, to be hands-on, to get down and dirty in the face of poverty, disadvantage, and abject need. Do we give our whole selves to others? Do we engage with the whole person, even the whole of our own selves, or do we secretly recoil at some aspects? Are our faith communities and our liturgies holistic and respectful of the body? We can take our pastoral-theological cue from both the Gospel and today's First Reading, where all of creation finds joyful liberty in God's healing and abundantly life-giving touch.
